11. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year (maximum five bullets)

Significant contribution made by the IQAC _2022-23 ? In order to promote experiential learning where students are encouraged to 'Earn while they learn', IQAC had taken the initiative of organizing a financial empowerment program during the 50th year of Golden Jubilee celebration. Students of the Institution irrespective of their subject discipline participated in exhibiting their creative skills and set up stalls for selling their crafts. Such initiatives were aimed at making the students mentally stable, and confident in their future life. ? To recover from the devastation which was imposed upon the mental health of young students due to Covid 2019 pandemic, IQAC took initiative to organize a program titled "Developing Mental Health and Social Awareness Program for current Generations" just after reopening of the College under the aegis of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and Women's Cell of Rabindra Mahavidyalaya in collaboration with WHY (Wellbeing and Happiness for You), an independent and non-profit making Organization accredited by The National Council of Education, Bengal (NCEB) addressing the social and cultural backdrop of mental health in a series of one-toone counseling. ? An initiative was taken in preserving intangible heritage of the locality as one of the significant extension activities of Heritage Cell of Rabindra Mahavidyalaya which was formed in the session 2022-2023. INTACH (Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage), an All India based Heritage Non-Government Organization, working on heritage preservation all over India inspired the History Department to form a Heritage Cell in the Institution. Teachers and students participated in a rally, talked to the local people and convinced them regarding the importance of

conservation of the dilapidated heritage temple situated near the college campus. The temple's frontside had beautiful carvings of terrracota plates with Shivalinga's different motifs and Vishnu Dashavataras, and also carvings showing various daily life activities of medieval Bengal. ? IQAC promoted several activities of Placement Cell where a five day placement orientation program was conducted to make them the students aware of different job oriented courses where The collaborating partners of this five days long programme were The 19th Hole Academy, Arambagh, JIS Foundation, Kolkata, Netaji Subash Foundation and Tarakeswar School of Hotel Management, Tarakeswar, Hooghly, George Telegraph, Kolkata, Centum Learning Ltd., Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI), EIRO. ? IQAC of our Institution initiated a collaborative program with Purbasha Eco Helpline Society, an organization with which a MoU was established. The Department of Geography, and Purbasha Eco Helpline Society, planted mangrove in the Chargheri areas of South 24 Parganas, Indian Sundarban, to safeguard the mangroves from natural catastrophes and to raise awareness of the value of mangroves among students and the local population. The mangrove plantation gave the local rural population a wider range of employment opportunities. The initiative aimed to raise awareness of the value of mangroves for the Sundarbans' marginalized population in the wake of the epidemic, as well as to highlight the pleasures of plantations and assist in the creation of a bio-shield for the area.

15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

As we did in the previous years, we have arranged for multidisciplined approaches as a way of implementing the spirit of NEP 2020. Events are held whereby each could become a platform for collaboration and exchange between experts and students hailing from different subject-disciplines. The Science Day, for example, is one program when a former professor of Physics delivers a lecture on the theme earmarked for the year while students of Physics wall up their magazine 'Physica' with writings on relevant topics. Students and teachers from other departments gather together as a way of sharing

the experience and views and add to their knowledge and efficacious use of information or data of a different discipline with a bearing on their specific subjects.

Mental health awareness and counseling is another important event geared to take note of the emotional state of affairs of our students and that too very successfully. Though Psychology is not being taught in our institution, we still continue to impart timely help in this regard cutting across all the disciplines that our students belong to. Celebration of birthdays of eminent theorists, scientist and teachers is one kind of program where students are encouraged to take part as they are made to listen to the innovative skills or sometimes insights and entrepreneural talent such persons are known for and thereby inculcate a vision of life that is many shaded and does not encourage a monocolored view of things. The Placement cell of our college is also another effective platform that arranges for training programs by various skill development agencies that finally attempt or help at recruitment of students that naturally hail from different disciplines though they learn the basics of computer and other usual soft skills deemed necessary for getting a job. This helps generate a mindset that appreciate the need for multi tasking and a multipronged approach irrespective of the specific training one receives as a student of a particular subject.

The interdisciplinary area is likewise taken care of. The School of languages renamed as the 'Centre for languages' takes the initiative of arranging a seminar on the philosophical and practical aspects of post-structuralism by the eminent scholar Sourav Kar Bhukta which imparts some valuable inputs to students of Bengali English and Sanskrit.

During the celebration of the Golden Jubilee, Bengali, English and Sanskrit departments arrange a lecture session on the history and evolution of Bengali little magazine that touches upon the whole issue from a local as well as an international perspective. Professor Barendu Mondal from Jadavpur University, Kolkata deliver the pertinent speech. Moreover the students of these three departments take part in a debate and project of book reviews at the presence of scholars and literary cultural activists from Tritiyo Parisar, Kolkata.

The Nature Club of the college arranges for events where the department of geography often shares the onus with either Botany or Zoology and Microbiology or all and olds events like the observation of World Water Day etc.

The department of Physical Education also collaborates with Defence studies in taking out educational excursions where both disciplines share their participation or venture.

So multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary become not only synonymous in their common intent but help create a synergy aimed at making students of the future who mind their practical skills while getting trained about the theoretical and potentially interrelated aspects of knowledge.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credit referred to as ABC in short, is a virtual mechanism that will deal with the credits earned by students of Higher Education Institutes in India and which are recognised by the University Grants Commission (UGC)

The University of Burdwan took the initiative to create academic Bank of credit for each and every student of undergraduate level after getting guidance from UGC. IQAC of RABINDRA MAHAVIDYALAYA gives the responsibility to appropriate nodal officials to guide our students for creating their Academic Bank of credits and successfully it was done in due time. The university made it mandatory for each and every student before their registrations. This achievement is going to be very helpful for the students to keep their records in a safe place in a centrally secured DigiLocker free of cost.

17.Skill development:

In this session a good number of initiatives have been taken from several departments to develop soft skill among students. While department like Defence studies, Philosophy organized quiz contest for developing interpersonal skill among students, Department of Chemistry, Defence Studies, Political Science and History tried to enhance their communication skill, along with listening skill and reasonability by organizing Students Seminar. It also encouraged them to assume the skill of time management in an effective way. The Department of Botany also arranged a lecture series on Plant Science which enriched students by developing their listening skill and encouraged them to further cultivate the attribute of problem solving skills. Movie shows arranged by the Department of English also helped students to enhance their capacity of listening and make them aware about the skill of communication, and develop their potential ability to connect with the reality and make enable them to perceive an idea of time management.

Language and communication skill: College tried to nurture the language and communication skills on different occasions by using several means. Mainly Humanities and Language departments of this college have performed the key role regarding this matter. In this session to enhance communication skill among students a few initiatives have been taken by the department of English. For example, it organized extempore competition, in which myriads topics from various subjects, current affairs and relevant subject-career-related issues were given to the students, and they were asked to deliver their speech. Debate competition organized by the English department also adds some positive inputs in such initiatives.

Life skill (Yoga, Physical fitness, health and hygiene): Our College has successfully motivated students to take part in various programmes organized on Yoga, Physical fitness, health and hygiene related matters. In this session under the guidance of the faculty members of Physical Education department students participated in the Yoga classes, celebrated Yoga Day under the banner of 'Yoga for humanity' and raised awareness among others about the various advantages of Yoga practice. Besides this, to keep students physically fit Physical Education department trained them in aerobics, calisthenics along with other routine activities (running, jugging). In addition to this twelve station Multi Gym facility is also available for the students. In this session a good number of sports events have been organized by the Physical education department among which District Level Inter College Games and Sports championship, 2022-2023 was remarkable.

ICT / computing skills: In this session a few small scale initiatives have been taken to make students computer-literate. For example Commerce department of this college has taken initiatives to enhance the skill of their students in various fields of computing like Tally and other related arena. Not only so, the faculty members also guided them in the preparation of payroll, salary sheet, calculating I. Tax, and make them aware about the using of Excel for computing. Similarly, Department of Physics also facilitated computer programming for their students. Though most of these initiatives were department specific and a small group of students were benefited from such initiatives but it produced a large scale demands from the other students to make them be a part of such programme.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The School of Languages, to be renamed as the Centre for Languages,

is one institutional agency meant for academic or scholarly activity with a view to preserving the native tradition and culture, especially its linguistic medium and components that are threatened by the all pervasive presence of an Anglophonic bias or sometimes even by any Indian language that is regionally predominant. Any historian or researcher understands the importance of preserving the significant registers of a fading episteme that bears hints or suggestions and insights of human progress, culture and evolution that may get obliterated if otherwise not preserved. Digitization of such records may help in archivization which the institution has undertaken as a gesture of preservation of the dying modes of communication and as a way of preserving and perpetuating the Indian knowledge system.

The Department of Physical Education celebrates the 'International Yoga day to encourage fitness health and mental hygiene among students in a program appropriately named as 'Yoga for Humanity'. It aims to impart knowledge to the students regarding the philosophy of Yoga as one of the sought after training skills which takes care of the body and mind. The traditional language of body and mind coordination is looked upon as a method for creating a robust student strength.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Traditionally in India, learning outcome for any Institute of Higher Education had been confined to the academic results that a student had been expected to excel in. However, we have reached a more mature view of things and now comfortably settle for outcomes that are not purely academic though produced while being part of the curricula. Our Golden Jubilee celebration in November 2022 showcased many such endeavors including a sincere attempt at instilling confidence through financial empowerment of students. Food and Handcraft stalls are set up as a way of display and sell of delicacies and decorative items as merchandise and direct experience being a part of the produce and its sale had had been a real pleasure for students while they keep going into self -reliance while dealing with the appreciators and customers who let them feel the value for money in a very positive sense of the term. The cultural events also accommodate and give space to local troupes and

artists as also students and teachers of both genders thus promoting tolerance and respect among stakeholders while forging greater bonding with the local community. A model exhibition for science is also arranged where students from local schools take part and this has been aimed particularly as a way of inclusion that would build trust and a lasting relationship with Institutes of Secondary and Higher Secondary education from the catchment sector who may eventually get the benefit of exposure at a higher level as they may potentially choose for our college as the next destination of study. Sports are another area where athletes from various departments take part and it creates a typical bonhomie that only sports and participation in sports can forge. Male and female students take part and generate a sense of equity through participation; sharing match between the Students Union and teachers imparts a sense of friendliness and cooperation that always go a long way in strengthening a healthy academic atmosphere within the Institution.

20.Distance education/online education:

In our College the mode of Distance Education is not available but since the onset of Covid-19 the Online mode has been resorted to as an important way of imparting education. First, there are competent teachers and Resource Persons who are regularly being roped in via the Online mode for the benefit of the students. This is one sure way of overcoming physical distance and inaccessibility and this has proved to be quite an effective way of sharing knowledge. Moreover, if any regular faculty member fails to engage his or her routined class due to leave or there is any unintended break in the usual schedule due to some observation of events or an urgent work, the lost class/es are duly compensated for via the Online mode available in terms of G-meet or RMV Online, the latter being the institutional online education service made functional since the days of closure of physical classes due to the recent pandemic. The IQAC Co-Ordinator himself is in the habit of making effective videos of teaching Mathematics, since he is a teacher of this subject, and puts it in the G-drive for students to see and share at their own convenience. So the Online mode remains to be one effective way of imparting learning when or where the conventional mode of teaching cannot make much of a headway or simply cannot reach out due to logistical reasons.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

During this Academic Session the entire teaching learning process and internal assessments etc., were conducted in the off-line mode but University final examinations(theory) of semester 2, semester 4, semester-6 etc. held in the on-line mode like previous academic session. Practical examinations were held through Video Calls/Conference Calls.

The teachers took extra care to make them comfortable in the laboratory, filling-up the knowledge-gap among the students as much as practicable. A few webinars were held to complement the knowledge gain of the students. Librarians of our Institution extended their services to the students and teachers through E-resources/E-books/RMV online repository etc. apart from issuing books as per normal routine.Our institution had taken initiative for the newly admitted students to make them familiar with the college campus life as those students were out of the School Campus for a period of nearly two years.

"Golden Jubilee Celebrations" function of our college was held from 08/11/2022 to 11/11/2022. Apart from cultural functions, Science Model exhibition, Book fair, Little magazine fair, debate etc. were organized to provide exposure to the young minds of our students.

Entire plan of the curricular delivery was documented with the resolution of the meetings of the Academic Sub-Committee and IQAC cell.

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Our institution does not have academic autonomy therefore we are bound to implement the CBCS syllabus of the Mother
University(University of Burdwan) in our Institution. But the prescribed curriculum of various subjects of our Mother University do contain chapters/papers which includes Environment and Sustainability (e.g. Botany, Geography, Sanskrit, Zoology, Political Science, Physics) into the Curriculum. In addition to this there is one compulsary paper(Ability Enhancement Compulsary) on Enviornment Studies for all the students of Semester-I. Therefore each student studies a 100 marks paper (80 marks theory + 20 marks Project) on Enviornmental Studies.

The issues of gender and human values are reflected through the syllabic components of English Honours, The issue of gender has been reflected through literary works e.g. novel, short stories, poems and such others. In the Syllabus of English Honours through some texts

the students are being introduced with the issue of human values. The students learn some positive and negative values from Shakespeare's Macbeth. Thus literature plays the role of upholder of human values also . Thus, our Institutes integrates cross-cutting issues also but in a quite restricted manner only.

The institution tries to understand the learning levels of the students. Statutory Internal Assessments (IA) of the students helps the teachers to get an idea of level of their learnings. Apart from this teachers are able to identify the advanced learners and slow learners through their responses in the theory and practical classes. Though this mechanism is partly informal but it works.

Our institution organizes many programs considering the benefits of the advanced learners and slow learners. Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in making Science Models, Preparation of Charts etc. and encouraged to explain their works to the visitors come in the programs. Advanced learners are encourage to plan and prepare the scripts for conducting the programs (eg. Rabindra Jayanti, Annual Cultural Function, Basonto-Utsab etc.

For the slow learners teachers instruct them separately to make them more focussed in preparation of their final examination. In this academic session our institution took initiative to boost up the mental and emotional health of them by organizing students counseling program in collaboration with WHY (accredited by NCEB). This program has also helped the slow learners to develop their personalities.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The current guideline is to take one internal examination for each course. The frequency of internal examination is predetermined. The modes of internal examination are written in the CBCS guideline. Departments follow the stated guidelines and conduct written test, assignment, project, seminar etc. If student seminar is chosen as the mode, then every student is given a different topic to discuss. The department of English encouraged students to use powerpoint presentation while delivering seminar.

Many departments frame their own schedule of assessment programmes in excess of the prescribed guideline. Determination of frequency of such internal assessments are department specific and made after collective decisions taken by teachers. Modes followed are those which are prescribed in CBCS guideline. GOOGLE MEET and GOOGLE CLASSROOM were used widely by departments to conduct extra assignments. The department of Bengali assigns assignments continuously, take steps to improve the submitted materials and finally one of these assignments are chosen for the internal examination. Students are informed about such schedule and mode well before.

All departments discuss the results, major faults, ways of improvement with students. Whenever a written test is employed, where confidentiality is not the norm, transparency is ensured by showing the corrected answer scripts.

There can be grievances regarding questions, question pattern, short span between notice and day of examination, multiple examinations on a day, marking system etc. The institution has a student centric approach to redress potential grievances beforehand. Students may miss the written examination, may fail to submit assignments at the given date for health and other unavoidable reasons. Such cases are taken care of by the department. The department of Chemistry takes extra care to disallow overlapping of competitive examinations with any of their internal examination dates.

Students are made aware about the mechanism to deal with grievances related to internal examination. Students can make a verbal or a written complaint in their department. The departments try to resolve as soon as possible. The complainant is incorporated in the resolve mechanism.

If the grievance is not suitably resolved, the complainant can forward her complaint to Grievance Redressal Cell. The Grievance Redressal Cell, in a similar fashion, adopts a complainant-inclusive mechanism to resolve. Steps are taken at the earliest possible occasion.

The department of Zoology, while taking continuous practical assessments, has received complaints from students regarding paucity of suitable infrastructure. Though efforts are taken but still there is scope for improvement.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The College and its IQAC engage the Sub-Committees like IT Sub-Committee, Routine Sub-Committee along with the Academic Committee in order to identify needs for a Wi-Fi enabled campus besides the inbuilt robust computer network with inter-communication systems of Emails, Google Drive and WhatsApp groups. Provisions in the financial budget were provided for purchasing computers and IT/sound systems. The purchase sub-committee followed necessary steps towards purchasing the required equipment viz., computer aids and desktop/laptops facilities and etc. The departmental teachers conducted their classes with the aid of their departmental laptops and some projectors and white screen boards (for a few departments). Their facilities are gradually increased and in the academic session

2022-23, and a budget of Rs. 11,92,000/-was allocated for facilitating the different departments. Prior to the current academic session, sufficient arrangements have been made to develop the infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning process. The Library and Laboratories have also been provided with a budgetary funds of Rs. 3,50,000/- and Rs. 80,000/- respectively for this year to purchase required books, equipment including furniture and to carry out their recurring revenue expenses. Though the development is going on but still to achieve the desired target and excellence more funds are required.

Physical education department arranged the Hooghly District Inter-College Sports & Games championship - 2022(17.05.2.23-24.05.2023) funded by theEducation Directorate, Higher Education Dept., the Govt. of West Bengal.

Gymnasium: The College has gym equipment in its Gymnasium (area of 60*30 sq. ft.). At present, the students of the Physical education department, NSS, NCC and some teaching and non teaching staff are using the gymnasium. For sufficientmaintainance of facilities, the college needs more funds.

Yoga centre: Inside the gym building, Yoga classes are organized as per B.U curriculum. There are 20 Yoga mats and 4 number of gym-ball for the use of the students to maintenance their physical balance and fitness.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 - Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

The institution has established a sub-committee called IT Sub-Committee to oversee its IT facilities provided in the different departments and computer laboratories including the library. The subcommittee monitors on a monthly basis mostly and updates the facilities provided there with reference to regular system backups, dust cleaning, speed checking, anti-virus updates, system optimization, Wi-Fi upgrades, IP address maintenance, and physical LAN checking, and the overall institutional LAN mapping.

The college has installed LAN with a high Configuration Server. Installation of server based local area network (LAN) facility to provide fast flow of data across computers, internet connection in departmental computers to browse study materials, research paper, etc.

The college has one Learning Resource Centre (LRC) equipped with five working machines and one computer Laboratory dedicated for commerce Department(equipped with seven machines) and another computer laboratory (equipped with five computers) for Geography Department. All computers are interconnected through LAN. The network is provided by BSNL with band width 200 Mbps. For the Department of Mathematics, Statistics and Education new network is provided by Alliance Broadband with bandwidth of 60 Mbps.

The IT subcommittee starts initiative for making the Wi-Fi availability in the whole campus.

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 - The governance of the institution is reflective of and in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

The Mission of the College, "Vimuktascha Vimuchyate" is taken from the ancient text of Kathopanishad. It is quoted from original Sanskrit denoting a Karmic notion of work as the path towards emancipation. The Vision as a greater goal is set in tune with this stated Mission: Making an Enlightened, Informed, and Confident Local Community. 6.1.2 - The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

The College follows the W.B. Government Financial Regulation for purchases. At institutional purchase below the threshold limit of rupees one lakh, the purchase sub-committee takes the initiative of inviting tenders and selecting the best bidder. Beyond this limit, the college goes for the W.B. Government E-Tender portal for processing E-Tenders. Here also, the College follows decentralization and participative management. The College has floated a batch of E-Tenders for different construction projects primarily with assistance of an independent engineer selected through institutional tender process. The engineer was entrusted with tasks of (i) draftsmanship, (ii) technical assistance in uploading in the E-Tender portal, and (iii) supervision of project/s. The efforts made in the first E-Tender attempt were not materialized in awarding work orders to the contractors. The followup re-tenders needed expert assistances for uploading documents but at additional costs. The purchase sub-committee has unanimously resolved that the technical works of E-Tender uploading will be pursued by the purchase sub-committee itself and thereby, saving the college fund thereof. Henceforth, the College has been pursuing the uploading works of E-Tenders by the Purchase Sub-Committee. This endeavor has showcased the initiatives of the sub-committee as an instance of effective leadership and decentralization and participative management.

6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/perspective plan is effectively deployed

The College has effectively deployed strategic initiatives to receive the government funds. It has found a strategic opportunity for constructing infrastructure augmentation projects like toilets, supply of cooled drinking water, and rain water harvesting within the college. The College received prospects from the Public Health Engineering Department of West Bengal Government for submission of three proposals for such infrastructure augmentation to the Zilla Parisad, Hooghy, W.B. The building sub-committee strategized that: (i) "Modern Toilet" - constructing separate general toilets for the gents and ladies in the area beside the campus main gate of the College to facilitate guardians and students during the university examination periods, (ii) "Jaal Dharo Jaal Bhoro" constructing a rain-water harvesting plant for water conservation, and (iii) Stand Alone "Jalsatra" - constructing a water tank supplying cooled drinking water. The Zilla Parisad, Hooghly, W.B. sanctioned tender amounts to the respective contractors selected through the Government's bidding process respectively Rs. 15,00,000/-, Rs. 4,90,147/and 7,68,392/- and implemented accordingly. The efforts made by the Principal and President of the College at their effectively deployment were praiseworthy. On completion, the President of the College has inaugurated these three projects and opened them for the students and guardians.

6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Medical Services: The institution has one Health Center run by one non-teaching Casual staff Mr. Dinabandhu Singharay on some honorarium from the college fund for homeopathic medical services to all teaching and non-teaching staffs and students at urgent needs. The College has organized two Blood Donation Camps and one Eye-Check along with Health Check-Up Camps within the Campus. Reputed doctors from Peerless Hospital, Kolkata and Medical Hospital of West Bengal Government as well came to this College and extended their services for the welfare of the teaching and non-teaching staffs of this College.

Puja Advances: The institution keeps a track record for providing Puja Advances to its non-teaching staffs to a maximum celling of Rs. 10,000/- which are refunded by the employees in ten equal installments in the forthcoming months of the year and without any interest thereon. This benevolent practice assists the employees to address their greater needs during the periods of urgent monetary needs.

Loans from General Provident Fund (GPF): The institution maintains Group Provident Fund for its all-full-time teaching and non-teaching employees and following the concerned government rules and regulations, the employees are allowed to apply for partly refundable loans or non-refundable withdrawals from their accumulated contributions.

The Staffs' Performance Appraisal system in this Institution is followed and maintained as per the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) of the UGC for the Teachers and according to the established rules and regulations for the non-teaching staff. The IQAC coordinator along with the Principal of the College helps the Promotion Placement subcommittee of the College to prepare the necessary papers and documents for promotion of the Teachers from stage-I onwards. In the meeting of the IQAC, all the incumbents' applications are reviewed and the necessary papers and documents are sanctioned by the members. The coordinator puts his signature and forward the same to the Principal who check, verify and submit the same to the Higher education department along with the concerned university for nomination of their respective experts towards verifying the performance of the CAS applicants. Prior to promotion, the teachers are allowed to attain their respective Faculty Induction Programmes (FIP) and/or Refesher Courses (RC) and participation in concerned seminars and workshops after reviewing their attendance in the classes and completion of their respective Course Syllabus. During 2022-23 academic year, there was no case of CAS for the non teaching staffs but a few teachers promotion haveundergone the process.

As per government procedures, the College does not directly appoint any statutoryauditor for external auditing of the financial statements of the college. The department of higher education, W.B.Government appoints the auditor from time to time and accordingly, the statutory audit is conducted. The College has completed its tasks pertaining to statutory audits upto the financial year 2019-2020 and audited reports has been placed in the G.B. meeting and submitted to the Higher Education Department, W.B. Government. Though the books of accounts for the financial years 2020-2021, 2021-2022, and 2022-2023 are complete but till date no auditors have been appointed by the Government.

The last audit report finds thatstock register not maintained properly and incomplete in laboratory-based departments, asset register and and schedule for Advanced Payments not maintained properly. The College authority has discussed to appoint some external professionals to complete such registers.

The College authority has formed a internal Audit Sub-Committee since the Academic Session 2017-2018. But due to transfer out of the valued members and COVID-19 situations, the Sub-Committee could not function effectively. Presently, the said Sub-Committee is operating with the audit of employees' Provident Funds for each individual employee since 1997 onwards.

Library fees are collected from the students andis fully utilized for purchase of latest books, magazines and periodicals for fundamental subjects, purchase of computers and printers in the central library, purchase of books shelves and allieds etc. Maintenance of the library is done on a periodic basis with use ofpesticides, insecticides and other proper cares.

Laboratory fees are collected and is fully utilized for purchasing of new asset equipments, chemicals herbs, Serbs, orchids, toposheets, fish, cockroaches etc. for laboratory testing recurring expenditures. It includes physical education department.

Repair and maintenance fees are utilized for repair, maintenance, upkeep expenses of buildings, campus infrastructure, electrical appliances, laboratory equipments, office equipments etc.

Building fees are collected from the students on yearly basis. Theaccumulated fundsis utilized for construction of specific buildings and other specified infrastructures development as decided by the college authority.

The tuition fees collected from the students are utilized by transfer of 50% of such fees to the state government mandatorily and the balance amount is spend for meeting the regular expenses of the college viz., paying remuneration to casual non-teaching staffs, conducting additional career oriented courses, meeting expenses, travelling expenses, electricity expenses, generator fuel expenses etc.

The departments have flexibility on students' seminar presentation, workshop, assignments and class tests as well. On internal assessments, the IQAC directs Examination Subcommittee to take internal assessments. Subjects involving huge students prefer Class Test while departments provide assignment

to students for innovative learning. Students have acquired different skills of effective communications through their participations in the different workshops and seminars organized by the departments besides excursions and fieldtrips, participating in the NSS and NCC programmes, College sports and annual festivals. In an overall assessment, the College achieved mostly 6% increase in students appeared in 2023 final examination as compared to that in 2022 while there are around 13% increment in the male students and mostly 2% increment in the female students.

Some important measures include 1) exhibition cum sale of handmade art-pieces, jewellery and food items by our girl students during Golden Jubilee Celebration, 2) an orientation programme on toilet cleanliness and menstrual health, 3) Kanyashree related training, 4) Observation of International Women's Day, 5) publication of wall magazine, 6) spreading awareness on sexual harassment by conducting movie show, 7) organizing drama to protest the ill-effects of patriarchal society, and 8) promoting financial empowerment in the 2022-2023 session to advance gender equity. Besides, arranging girls' common room, recruiting gateman, CCTV facilities, and constant counselling are examples of genderfriendly facilities available in the campus.

- Every classroom and corridors are furnished with eco-friendly dustbins prepared by the students for waste paper deposition.
- Washroom and toilet effluents are released to the soak chambers connected with the respective buildings. The periodical cleaning of soak chambers are done. The liquid effluents are released to the inter-connected drainage system.
- Non toxic liquid laboratory wastes of Microbiology Department are deposited to a specific soak pit.
- Bio-Science building laboratories liquid deposits are released to their soak chambers at the building backyard.
- Rain water drainage system is constructed within campus for preventing water logging.
- Separate bio-degradable and non-bio-degradable wastebins have been stalled for regular and systematic waste disposal.
