6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

The vision whether individual or that of an institution is like an ideal. But clearly, it gives us a sense of direction. **“Making an enlightened, informed and confident local community”** is the vision our college which truly enshrines a collective aspiration of an essentially rural populace that once dreamt of education as a viable means of social progress and that precisely brought this college into being in less than half a century ago. The year was 1971. The college was named after Tagore and from a humble beginning Rabindra Mahavidyalaya has become an institution of higher education that commands a sense of admirable respect in the minds of the local residents. Tagore had his vision of a cosmopolitan brotherhood based on a steady exchange of educational means and cultural values between India and the rest of the world and it materialized in the birth of Visva Bharati. Our small college with all its myriad aspects of rural backwardness in a way truly follows in the path of Rabindranath. As an agency of higher education, it brings in the blessings of advancement and the benefits of enlightenment so that the people that live in and around Champadanga may gain into confidence and may try to be at par with other, more advanced sections of the society, traditionally known and respected for their greater quantum of achievement. Given the situation, the growing health of the college since the days of its inception is enough testimony of its socially vital role of continually adding to the information-base of the local community to enable it to look beyond its basically agro-based economy and ethos. This in itself is no mean achievement. In tandem with the vision, we also have a mission.

The mission of this college is succinctly expressed in the Sanskrit adage of **“Vimuktasya vimuchyate”** that originally occurred in Vishnu Sahasranam. This pertains to the highest attribute of a ‘liberated man’: a liberated soul can attain to a state of perfection through a continual exercise of his or her sense of liberty. ‘Jnan’ or ‘Knowledge’ is the only means by which this rare quality of freedom may be gained. A past wisdom thus re-combined with the present task of knowledge-gathering and dissemination may make our mission a truly unique and an appropriate one bringing us ever closer to the vision already detailed above.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The office and account department of the college has developed a management information system by uploading new software named CAMS.

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Since the college does not develop any curriculum but simply follows/implements the one framed by the university, the question of adapting quality improvement strategies does not arise.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Although the syllabi are framed not by the college but by the university to which it is affiliated each department adopts some innovative processes in teaching and learning. First of all, the faculties of each department meet at the beginning of each academic session for allocation of syllabic assignments, contents, fix dates for the class test and annual tests and prepare the academic calendar of that session. Secondly, almost all the departments organize students' seminars, quiz contests, etc. Some of the departments use PPTs for complementing conventional teaching learning for the Honours students. Multiple choice questions are also set in the class tests to encourage the students to read the text books thoroughly.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Apart from serving as centres for the university examinations each year, the college also conducts class tests and annual tests to evaluate the progress of the students. The answer scripts of such tests are shown to the students and their progress reports are sent to the guardians.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Since this is an undergraduate college, the students are not undergoing any research work during their three years course. But the faculty members who are closely associated with research activities are provided with the under mentioned facilities:-

- Allowing the faculty members to attend orientation course, refresher course, National/International/State level seminar/workshop and symposia.
- The internet facility is provided through which the researchers can access their information related to their research.
- The UGC grant is provided for attending seminars/workshop that include presentation of papers

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

To develop and update facilities in the library, the IQAC has adopted the following strategies :

- The physical infrastructure has been marginally improved. At present the library enjoys a space of 3000 sq.ft.
- Latest books and journals are purchased and subscribed.
- Library related information is provided to the students and the teachers at regular basis.
- Internet service has been made available to the library users.
- Some of the honours departments maintain and run a library of their own.
- Annual budgetary allocation is made available to each department for purchasing text and reference books.
- Almost all the science departments have received a certain amount of grant to purchase the instruments.
- Department of Geography has got Digital Theodolite, Digital Planimeter and GPS.
- Department of Defence Studies has got an Air Rifle.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The human resource of the college is managed in a free and democratic manner. For the management of the students' affair, the college has a students' council whose elections are held annually as per university statutes. The teachers' council and the non-teaching staff association look after the affairs of the teaching and non-teaching staff respectively. Above all, there is a Governing Body that manages and make scope of utilizing the total human resource of the college. The college's aim is to make optimum use of the available human resource.

During this year 01(one) assistant professors have joined the Institution. The recruitment of the non-teaching staff solely depends upon the standing committee which is also framed by the Governing Body.

The college has also made a garden of medicinal plants in the college campus. The surrounding campus is regularly cleared and cleaned, at least twice in a year, for hygiene purpose. The wash rooms and urinals /toilets are regularly cleared with disinfectant so that there is no chance of infectious disease to the students and staff. So the cost college up keep is high.

Feedback

All the departments distributed the feedback form to the Honours students and their parents in a prescribed format, where as many as students participated in it.

After analyzing their feedback, it has come to our notice that they are quite regular at their respective classes. Sometime due to lack of teachers, classes are not properly run, although some special classes are organized to complete the syllabus. Students in the science laboratories want more numbers of instruments.

Though the library has got sufficient number of collection in form of reference and text books but due to lack of technical personnel the overall services of the library are affected. Most of the students suggested that more facilities like Xerox centre for students, improved canteen facilities, lending more no of books , Wi-Fi system for the students , neat and clean play ground, organizing more number of career counselling programme are required to motivate the students and increase their attendance.

On the other hand while analyzing the parents feedback, it has been observed that parents are very much conscious about their ward's studies and expressed their willingness to help for all round development of the college. Parents are very much eager to share their views with teachers and wishing to have Parent Teacher Meetings.

Annexure-III

Practice –I

Title of the Practice

1. Environmental Awareness and Protection

2. Goal

The major aims of the practice followed by the institution are

- a) To inculcate awareness about environment protection and sustainability and to generate sense of environment protection among students.
- b) To make the campus more green by initiating the plantation programmes.
- c) To make all stakeholders aware of hazards related to use of plastic and other non-degradable pollutants.
- d) To encourage reduction, renewal and recycling of valuable resources.
- e) To implant that, resources such as freshwater is scarce and prudent use of the resource is to be made.
- f) To extend the consciousness among local community through extension activities.

3. The Context

Environment, as a common property resource, which is over utilised and polluted. It is not taken care of that such acts will in turn endanger us. Urbanisation has deteriorated the environment. Students can play an important role to protect environment.

While performing such activities, the major challenge was the inherent culture borne by stakeholders that are generally environment degrading.

Substituting plastic by other environment friendly materials makes products costly. People often do not accept these things due to their lack of their environmental awareness.

4. The Practice

The major practices that the institution followed are

- a) Students are requested to stop use of plastic or at least to reduce use of plastic. Use of plastic and thermocol in the canteen are not allowed.
- b) Burning of plastic is strictly prohibited within the campus. Plan was made to form a Nature Club to promote environment awareness.
- c) All stakeholders are requested to use both sides of paper. The office staff and teachers follow the practice.
- d) Though the impact of electronic communication and networking on carbon emission is debated, office staff and teachers are encouraged to use LAN facility and e-communication.
- e) Trees are planted to make the campus more green. 'Save Tree, Save Institution' campaign was launched.
- f) Students and staff are encouraged to save electricity.

The constraints are the borne culture of the stakeholders, non familiarity of some staff and teachers with e-communication etc.

5. Evidence of Success

There are some evidences of success

- a) Visible reduction in use of plastics is seen.
- b) Some students and a good number of teachers are seen to switch off electrical gadgets when not required.
- c) The process of formation of Nature Club started.

The results indicate that such programmes have positive effects but the effects attenuate if continuous efforts are not taken.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The problems encountered are already described as constraints. The programmes could not ensure wholehearted participation of all sections of students.

The financial resource required is not very significant. The available infrastructures are used to carry out such programmes.

The teachers and staff, NSS, all students are the major human capital used. The institution used internal faculty and staff to deliver talks.

7. Notes (Optional)

Such programmes can be better implemented if cooperation from local panchayet, administrative authorities is sought. This may ensure participation of local community in such activities.

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Best Practice-II

1. Title of the Practice

Assistance to school teachers (+2 level) on practical curriculum at Higher Secondary level.

2.Goal:

To get better quality of students in the undergraduate science subjects, it is necessary to teach the school students (+ 2 level) properly, but it is not possible to teach the students directly by the College Teachers. So, we have started to teach them indirectly i.e. by teaching the school teachers of local schools, through visit at the science departments of this College and also through visit of some faculties of this college at their schools.

3.The Context:

The practical curriculum at the H.S.(+2 level) science has been revised and updated in 2012-2013 session, but neither the school teachers updated by refreshers course/workshops, nor the laboratories of the schools are properly upgraded. Naturally, they used to skip the practical classes and ultimately the students were not learning properly. Therefore, the teachers at College level would have additional pressure to update the newly admitted students in B.Sc. Courses. A few very sincere teachers approached our faculties for assistance. Therefore it was decided to arrange some assistance programme for the school teachers of local schools at the science departments of this College and at their respective school with the help of the resourceful faculties available in this institution.

4.The Practice:

In the year 2013, five teachers of Physics from different schools under Tarakeswar Block and Pursurah Block were sending by their respective authority who learned the practical curriculum of class XI spending three hours per week, which they can conduct at their school, even if the laboratory is not properly updated. A few teachers got trained also in the department of Chemistry. This assistance programme was continued for ten weeks. Later on in few cases teachers faced problems to conduct the practical classes because of newly installed instruments and again requested the faculties to visit their laboratories for solution. This was also attended by the faculties of this institution.

In the year 2014, another group of 07 teachers were trained in the practical curriculum of class XII. After words different Head Masters/Head mistresses requested to arrange similar assistance programme in Biology also.

Therefore, in 2014 assistance was extended for seven teachers in Biology also.

5.Evidence of Success:

More and more teachers from different schools are interested to participate in the programme, which is evident from the requests received in the subsequent years. We find a few of the B.Sc. First year students who got admitted in this institution in the running academic session and studied in those schools are better trained and doing well in their practical classes.

6.Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Due to scarcity of laboratory space and scarcity of full time teachers in this institution it is not possible to attend a large number of participants. Due to lack of infrastructure and man power it was not possible to hold a workshop to cater a large number of school teachers this type of assistance. The programmes were informal types in respect to this college.

There was no fund to provide TA/DA or refreshment to the participants. Faculties who acted as resource person were not given any remuneration or refreshment.

In the second year of this assistance programme in Physics, the college intends to have the same teacher participants who attended the same in the previous years on Class XI curriculum to make a group of school teachers who will be expert and able to conduct such programme to teach their colleagues of other schools. But the participants were mostly new comers.

The faculties of the science departments acted as resource persons, the laboratories of this college were used, but sometimes low cost designs of the practical courses (to make feasible to take the class at the school with low infrastructure) were made.

In future to hold such types of programmes some funding is essential from UGC or any other agencies.
